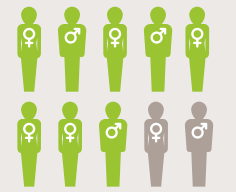

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CHAMPION RIGHTS

ADVOCACY SUCCESSES, BY COUNTRY, 2020

IPPF’s advocacy creates an enabling environment to increase access to services, promote sexual and reproductive rights and gender equality, and reduce stigma and discrimination. IPPF makes a significant difference to the lives of millions by advocating for changes to laws and policies in support of sexual and reproductive health and rights, and opposing those that are harmful.



Profamilia Colombia

A lawsuit, seeking the total criminalization of abortion in Colombia, was launched by the anti-choice movement in 2020. Profamilia mobilized support and filed a legal challenge as technical expert in sexual and reproductive rights to combat this threat. The Constitutional Court agreed with Profamilia’s arguments backed up by scientific evidence and ruled that the suit would not be heard. This prevented the case going ahead which could have been potentially devastating for abortion rights in Colombia.

Sudan Family Planning Association (SFPA)

In April 2020, the government of Sudan approved a new law criminalizing female genital mutilation (FGM), making it punishable by up to three years’ imprisonment. Sudan has one of the highest rates of FGM in the world, with an estimated 87 per cent of women aged 14 to 49 having undergone some form of FGM. SFPA had conducted advocacy activities for many years by lobbying parliamentarians and working with local community leaders in order to create favourable political and social conditions to end FGM in Sudan.

Reproductive Health Uganda (RHU)

In November 2020, RHU and its partners successfully applied for Uganda’s 10,000 local drug shops to be approved by the National Drug Authority as providers of injectable contraceptives. These shops have convenient locations and opening hours, greatly expanding access to a popular and affordable contraceptive method. This followed a pilot in which 9,000 women accessed injectable contraceptives from drug shops, of who 17 per cent were not previously using any form of contraceptive and 36 per cent were under 25.

Albanian Centre for Population and Development (ACPD)

As a result of steady advocacy from ACPD and partners, the revised standard operating procedures for health workers to minimize the risk of domestic violence and gender-based violence in civil emergencies were formally approved by the Albanian Ministry of Health in February 2020. ACPD led the process of drafting guidelines for delivering care in emergency settings, contributed to the drafting of the standard operating procedures, and conducted advocacy activities with key stakeholders including roundtables, policy dialogues and awareness-raising activities.

Family Planning Association of Nepal (FPAN)

Following formal and informal advocacy and lobbying by FPAN, the Nepalese Ministry of Education confirmed in 2020 that comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) would be integrated into the national curriculum for secondary pupils. FPAN used local, national and international channels to promote the inclusion of age-appropriate CSE in the curriculum and ensure that young people in Nepal have the information and knowledge to make decisions for themselves.

Indonesian Planned Parenthood Association (IPPA)

The Indonesian government approved the *Guide to protecting women’s rights from discrimination and gender-based violence in pandemic situations* in 2020. IPPA was actively involved in the preparation of this guide. The final document is a key reference for all providers and other stakeholders in ensuring the prevention and handling of GBV in crisis and disaster situations, which is one of the components of IPPF’s Minimum Initial Service Package (MISP).

IPPF European Network Regional Office (ENRO)

The *EU Gender Action Plan (GAP) III*, adopted by the European Commission (EC) in November 2020, includes sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) as a key component of gender equality, with an entire pillar of the GAP being focused on SRHR. SRHR is also mainstreamed in the sub-pillar on education, with a specific reference to supporting comprehensive sexuality education, and in the sub-pillar on health, with a specific mention of supporting SRH in the context of universal health coverage. The GAP also determines funding targets for the European Union (EU) development aid going to gender equality, including a target for each EU partner country. IPPF ENRO contributed to the adoption of the new Gender Action Plan, including drafting a position paper on SRHR in the GAP that was shared with the EC and EU Member States.

IPPF (global)

During the 42nd session of the UN Human Rights Council (HRC) in 2020, the resolution adopted on *Elimination of all forms discrimination against women and girls* had a focus on multiple and intersecting forms of discrimination. The phrase ‘the right to bodily autonomy’ was included, making this the first time this right has been recognized outright in an annual resolution adopted by consensus. Similarly, the resolution contains affirmations of sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights, without any qualifiers, and the right to sexual and reproductive health, the first time this resolution has included either reference explicitly. IPPF worked closely with the Member States co-sponsors of the resolution and civil society partners, including through a joint mark-up and outreach, to ensure the strongest possible language on SRHR issues and intersectional discrimination.
